

You may find the answers to some of your questions in this section. For all relevant information about the VMFRC, you can consult our services guide, health care guide, our activities program and all other activities offered.

A transfer requires many steps and good





preparation. The following is a checklist to help you one step at a time. Do you and your loved ones have questions or would you like to be guided toward the right resources? The VMFRC offers you many services and tools to accompany you during your posting. Geography and climate

Québec (Quebec City) is the National Capital of Quebec. There are many sectors, which allows you to find the perfect place to live.

In Ouebec, there are four well-defined seasons: winter, spring, summer and fall. The temperatures during a year vary between 30°C and -20°C. Winters are cold with lots of snow. Appropriate clothing such as a very warm coat, winter pants and all the winter accessories (boots, hats, scarves, mittens, and neck warmers) is necessary to prepare for cold temperatures which can drop to -35°C. In the spring, when the snow melts, there can be floods in the flood zones (caused by abundant precipitations and/or if the snow melts quickly). Summers may be hot and humid. The Greater Quebec area is a paradise for summer sports enthusiasts (cyclists, hikers, motorcyclists) and winter sports enthusiasts (skiing, snowshoes, snowmobiles). Moreover, there is a wide range of activities such as: Village Vacances Valcartier, Galeries de la Capitale (indoor amusement park), aquarium, museums, and pick-your-own: apples, pumpkins, blueberries, strawberries, Ouébec is a diversified, colourful city that is worth a visit in the fall to see the impressive fall colours of the trees.

Language

Even though the main language of Quebec City is French, you can hear other languages in various areas. If your first language is English, there are a few primary/secondary schools and one English public CEGEP. There are also Anglophone organizations, such as Voice of English-speaking Quebec (VEQ). In Quebec City, it is recommended to learn French to have access to most of the city's services. However, it is common to meet service providers or people from the community who are bilingual or who know basic English; you just need to speak slowly.

Second-language courses (French and English) are offered by the VMFRC.

There is a government program for French immersion language courses with the possibility of grants. If you need more information, or would like to apply, refer to the VMFRC's employment support and education program.

Pace of Life in the City

Quebec City is a unique, dynamic city, which offers all types of activities and services in the downtown area and various municipalities. During the summer months, there are various festivals and outdoor activities. To find moments of relaxation and a peaceful pace of life, there are many nature trails and bike paths. To learn about the various activities or services in your municipality, consult their website or Facebook page. In addition, St.-Jean-Baptiste Day is a big celebration on the Plains of Abraham (also in some municipalities), and it is a statutory holiday for Quebecers.

Facts and Statistics -Quebec City and the Province

Population

- Population: In July 2016, Quebec City had a population of 531,902 and the metropolitan community population was 807,200.
- Average age: 44 years old
- Language: French (85.5% of the Quebec population)

A few facts about the province

- Legal age of majority: age 18
- Alcohol is legal at the age of majority and marijuana at age 21.
- The Tobacco Control Act: : legal age (age 18) is required to purchase tobacco products. It is prohibited to smoke in public places and workplaces, and at a distance of less than nine metres from establishments.
- Distracted driving: It is illegal to use one's cellphone or other devices when driving.
- Bike helmets: Strongly recommended.
- Turning right on a red light: Permitted except in places where signage prohibits it and on the island of Montréal.
- Child car seats and seatbelts: Visit the child seatbelt section on the <u>Société</u> <u>de l'assurance automobile du Québec</u> (SAAQ) website.

As of April 2019, the law requires that children use booster seats until they are 145 cm tall or 9 years old. <u>More information</u>.

2nd Canadian Division Support Base Valcartier

The 2nd Canadian Division of Support Base Valcartier, which covers an area of 288 square kilometres, is located northwest of Quebec City, a 20-minute drive away. The base has the advantage of being at an ideal geographical location for nature lovers, while also being in proximity to the city of Quebec. Base Valcartier is divided into three main areas: administrative, residential and training. It is one of the best-equipped bases in the country.


Like a small town, Base Valcartier also has two schools, a sports centre, a shopping centre, a community centre, a recreation department, a newspaper, a military hospital, a dental clinic, a chapel, a golf course, and cross-country ski, snowshoe and fitness trails.

Since the Greater Quebec City area is a large area, we encourage you to check the bylaws in the city you are in, because bylaws differ from one place to another.

For example, check:

- Dog bylaws (authorized dog breeds, allowed or not in parks, city fines for non-compliance with bylaws).
- Are there garbage, recycling, and compost services? What are the pickup days?
- Do you have access to the ecocentre? If so, which one?
- Do you have public transit services? What are the routes?
- Access to a municipal library?
- What are the educational institutions? Public/private?

Google Map at your service

Google Maps can help you find the location of the city, and the distance of the city to your base or to your employment.

You can also enter your departure time in Google Maps, to give you an estimate of the time it will take to go from your home to your job, taking traffic into account.

Note: If you are using your cellphone, click on the bus icon, then change the time and click again on the car icon to see the route with traffic.

Automobile

Vehicle registration differs from one province to another. The following section will provide relevant information concerning applicable laws in Quebec. The Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec (SAAQ) is a provincial Crown corporation which offers universal car insurance in Quebec as well as the driver's licences and car registration information.

Procedure for the transfer of drivers' licences

You can continue to drive with your driver's licence for the first three months after you move. After that time, you must obtain a driver's licence issued by the SAAQ. To exchange a driver's licence issued in another country or province or to obtain a Quebec driver's licence, you must make an appointment by calling 418-643-7620. Here are the documents required to exchange your driver's licence (always bring the original documents):

- Driver licence from another province or territory of Canada;
- Driving records from another province;
- Proof of Canadian citizenship or right of residence in Quebec;
- Proof of residence in Quebec;
- Proof that you lived in the province or territory that issued your licence if you obtained it less than three years ago.

*In Quebec, you must pay for your driver's licence each year, just like your vehicle's registration. You need to have a photo taken only every eight years.

Vehicle Registration

When you arrive in Quebec, you must have your vehicle inspected by a SAAQauthorized agent, whether it is new or used. Your vehicle must comply with the established standards in Quebec if you want to obtain your licence plate. Winter tires

It is **mandatory** to use winter tires from December 1 to March 15 (inclusive). It is highly recommended to extend the use of winter tires since snow begins in November and ends in April. All-season tires are not permitted during the winter months.

Health care in Quebec City

Residents of our province are covered by the Régie de l'assurance maladie du Quebec (RAMQ). RAMQ is a Quebec government agency under the Ministry of Health and Social Services. Its mission is to administer the public health and drug insurance plans as well as to inform the public, manage eligibility for individuals, remunerate health professionals and ensure the secure flow of information. It is also responsible for issuing health insurance cards, which allow access to public health care services.

The Régie's reception desk is located in the offices of Services Québec and the Société de l'assurance automobile du Québec (SAAQ). Photos for all persons age 14 or over can be taken on site (fees will apply). In addition, copies of original documents required for each person's registration can be made on site.

Termination of the RAMQ waiting period for members of military families who are posted

In response to a request from the Canadian Armed Forces, please note that when a member is assigned to another Canadian province or territory, his or her family members (spouse and children) who have settlement status will become eligible for public health care upon their arrival in their host province as they are now exempt from the 90-day waiting period planned in the regulations for the entire population. To demonstrate this situation, the family must provide the document issued by the Canadian Armed Forces containing the assignment instructions (posting message). You will receive your card within 7 to 10 business days following the receipt of your completed request. If you require health care in the meantime, you can use the health care services covered by RAMQ by requesting a registration confirmation. This can be done in person at a RAMQ office or by phone.

Your health card will be valid for one year, and then you must renew it for it to be valid for eight years.

Finding a Family Doctor

It can be difficult to find a family doctor in Quebec. To help you, you should sign up for the online waiting list to find a family doctor (Guichet provincial d'accès à un médecin de famille (GAMF)). After clicking on the link, please follow the detailed instructions to register.

Pregnancy Follow-Ups

Clinics that offer pregnancy follow-ups

We suggest that you check with the clinics in your area as some doctors offer pregnancy follow-ups. In addition, you can check with CLSCs for more information and to access a doctor. Health professionals involved in pregnancy and childbirth follow-ups include family doctors, midwives, obstetricians, nurse practitioners (since 2007) and gynecologists.

Please note: If you are moving to Quebec City and are already pregnant, some clinics may ask you to bring a copy of your medical records and blood tests. Please note that VMFRC offers: prenatal classes, a Baby-on-Board Group (for pregnant women), Welcome Baby (prenatal and/or postnatal visits), baby massage alone or accompanied and a baby small talk group. In addition, we have a scale to weigh your baby.

In Quebec, families are entitled to a child support allowance in addition to the federal family allowance. It is paid quarterly (January, April, July and October). However, you can request a monthly payment by calling the government. Financial assistance is paid to all eligible families with dependent children under age 18 residing with them.

The amount of the Family Allowance you are entitles to depends on:

- The number of dependent children under age 18 residing with the beneficiary;
- The number of children in shared custody;
- Family income, i.e., the sum of the incomes of both spouses (if applicable);
- Marital status (with or without a spouse).

Babysitters

The average rate for teenage babysitters is between \$5 and \$10/hour. The rate varies depending on the individual and the number of children.

Education and training

Education System

The Quebec education system is different from that of the other provinces of Canada. It is managed by the Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur [Ministry of Education and Higher Education]. The system includes four levels of teaching: preschool education (pre-kindergarten and kindergarten), primary and secondary education (including general training and job training), college education (including preuniversity and technical training) as well as university education.

- From kindergarten to secondary 5. Offered in both official languages.
- Preschool education (ages 4-5) is not mandatory
- Attendance of primary school is mandatory from ages 6 to 16.
- Most schools in Quebec are organized under school boards.

The picture on the following page by the Commission scolaire de Jonquière illustrates Quebec's educational system.


English schools

- In Quebec, to have access to English schools, the following criteria must be met:
 - Children who have received the major part of their elementary or secondary school instruction in English in Canada;
 - Whose brother or sister did the major part of his or her elementary or secondary studies in English in Canada;
 - Whose father or mother did the major part of his or her elementary studies in English in Canada;
 - Whose father or mother attended school in Quebec after August 26, 1977, and could have been declared eligible for instruction in English at that time.

- When a posting occurs:
 - The CF member must have their unit sign the form (where they are currently assigned), for approval purposes.
 - The form is usually valid for a three-year period.
 - You must sign the form, attach a copy of the posting message and proof of your new address.
 - If you want more information, you should refer to the school board in your new neighbourhood.


Employment Insurance Benefits

To receive benefits, you must have worked for the number of hours required over a period of 52 weeks. To know how many hours you must work in Quebec, please visit: <u>servicecanada.gc.ca</u>

To apply for Employment Insurance, you must use the above-mentioned address. Your employer is required to give you a record of employment. The business can also send it electronically if it is registered in the system. Otherwise, you must send it by mail to the address indicated in your electronic claim or report to the Service Canada Centre nearest you.

*Please note that when you leave your job for a posting, you must include the posting message with your claim and indicate that the reason for the voluntary departure was as follows: Needed to accompany spouse (military member) to another place of residence. www.canada.ca/en/employmentsocial-development/programs/

Canada Post

When you move, you can have your personal mail forwarded to your new address. Some fees apply for this service.

Taxes and income taxes

In Quebec, you must file two tax returns: a return for the provincial government and one for the federal government. We encourage you to visit the Revenue Quebec website for more information. You will find the following guide there: "New Residents and Income Tax," which explains the taxation system.

Your tax return must be filed no later than April 30 of the calendar year following the tax year, or on June 15 if you or your spouse reports business income.

**An extension may be granted if the CF member is deployed during the income tax filing period. **

Electricity

In Quebec City, electricity is managed by Hydro-Québec. It is recommended to sign up for a contract online to save money on registration fees. Click on the following link: http://www.hydroquebec.com/residential/ customer-space/moving/

There are two billing options:

1st option

Hydro-Québec bills you monthly by estimating the annual cost of your energy consumption and spreading it out in 12 equal monthly payments.

2nd option

Hydro-Québec bills you every two months for your actual electricity consumption for the period.

Alternative heating methods

There are different options: electricity, natural gas, oil, water, wood or wood pellets.
